Two new two reports from the Sequenced Treatment Alternatives to Relieve Depression (STAR*D) project appear in this issue. In the Level 3 augmentation trial, patients who had not benefited adequately from at least two previous medication trials augmented their current antidepressant with lithium or T₃. Nierenberg et al. (p. 1519) report that although remission and response rates were modest and not significantly different between the two, they were higher with T₃, which was better tolerated than lithium. In the Level 4 trial, patients who had not obtained relief in Level 3 switched either to tranyl-cypromine or combination treatment with extended-release venlafaxine and mirtazapine. As McGrath et al. report (p. 1531), remission and response rates were modest here too,



although the combination treatment was better tolerated and produced greater improvements in symptoms than tranylcypromine. Cover design by Jason Glance.
