Fluidity of the Subsyndromal Phenomenology of Borderline Personality Disorder Over 16 Years of Prospective Follow-Up

The symptoms of borderline personality disorder are quite fluid, with remissions and recurrences being common. However, the more clinically urgent acute symptoms of the disorder (e.g., self-mutilation) seem to have a better prognosis than the less turbulent temperamental symptoms (e.g., chronic anger).

Neural Correlates of Irritability in Disruptive Mood Dysregulation and Bipolar Disorders

Youths who labeled facial emotions demonstrated that irritability correlates with amygdala activity across all intensities of all emotions in disruptive mood dysregulation disorder but only fearful faces in bipolar disorder. Thus, the transdiagnostic presence of irritability may not call for a common treatment approach.
