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

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The 20-Year Longitudinal Trajectories of Social Functioning in Individuals With Psychotic Disorders

Poorer social functioning across the 20 years after first admission for a psychotic disorder was associated with other unfavorable real-world outcomes. Psychotic mood disorders had better social functioning overall than schizophrenia spectrum disorders. Differences in social functioning were similar in childhood.

Rare Genome-Wide Copy Number Variation and Expression of Schizophrenia in 22q11.2 Deletion Syndrome

Schizophrenia risk in 22q11.2 deletion syndrome is associated with additional rare copy number variations outside the 22q11.2 deletion region, supporting a multigenic hypothesis for schizophrenia.

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



This is a practical guide to the complex world of management in psychiatric practice and covers the various skills necessary for running services, plus personal development skills.




