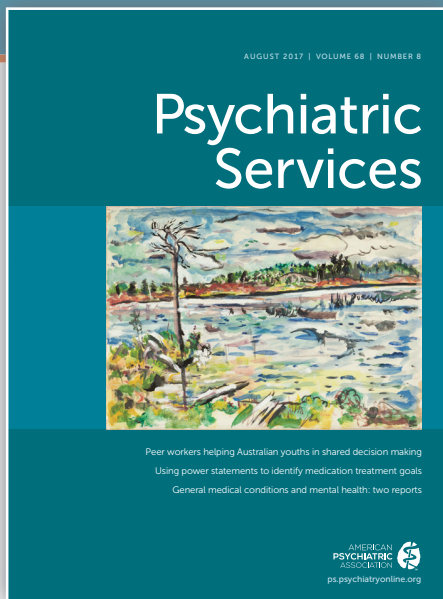

Incomes and Outcomes: Social Security Disability Benefits in First-Episode Psychosis

A 2-year multifaceted specialty care program for patients with first-episode psychosis did not significantly reduce the likelihood of receiving Social Security disability benefits. Patients who received disability benefits had increased total income and fewer days with alcohol intoxication but fewer days of employment and poorer motivation.

The Long-Term Effects of Antipsychotic Medication on Clinical Course in Schizophrenia

The benefits of antipsychotic drugs in initial and maintenance treatment of schizophrenia are strongly supported by many randomized controlled trials. Clinical imaging studies and animal models have not established neurodegenerative effects of antipsychotics in human patients.
