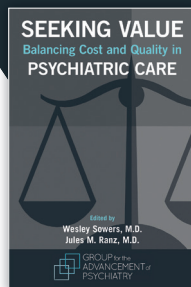

Anterior Insula–Associated Social Novelty Recognition: Pivotal Roles of a Local Retinoic Acid Cascade and Oxytocin Signaling

Anterior insula is known to be a key brain region for a wide range of psychiatric disorders, including social cognition deficits, but its mechanism is still unclear. In this study, the authors manipulated expression of Cyp26B1, an anterior insula-enriched molecule that is crucial for retinoic acid degradation and involved in the pathology of neuropsychiatric conditions, in animal models and aimed to address this question. Results show that anterior insula mediates social novelty recognition, which is regulated by a local retinoic acid cascade and oxytocin signaling.
