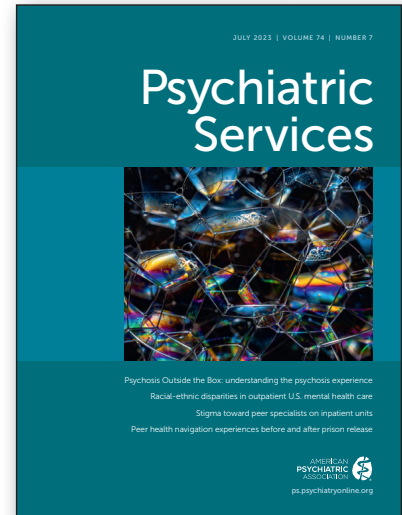


# See and Hear What the Field Is Discussing!
